A number of issues arose, which are dealt with below:

Site Security

There was a long discussion on site security; ironically, a week later, half a dozen sheds had their locks vandalised. Ann Marie Chapman-Bennett, from the Northwood Hills Safer Neighbourhoods Police Team, was present at the meeting and gave valuable advice at the time. She subsequently gave us some more advice – see below. Please note: If you have crops stolen or signs of vandalism, then report it immediately to us by phone or email. If you have property stolen or serious damage, then also report it to the Neighbourhood Police Team. Even if nothing can be done at that moment, we need to build up a picture which may help to prevent a recurrence. The Society works closely with the Police on matters like this.

On The Allotment

Allotments are hard to protect, gardening tools are not cheap, don't make it easy for people to steal them. Get to know your neighbours on the allotment - if they know you, they are more likely to be suspicious if someone else is on your plot. Remember; don't leave expensive equipment on-site if you can avoid it.

The Shed

Fit a good lock on the shed door. A little expense can be money well spent and may help with insurance claims later if the worse does happen. The fittings should be bolted through the shed door and reinforced at



the back with a steel plate. The hasp should have concealed screws. The padlock itself should not be less that 2.5 inches in width and made of hardened steel. The lock should have no less than five pins. A closed shackle type will reduce the risk of the lock being forced. Any locksmith or good DIY shop will advise you on the strongest available. If you already have a small padlock, change it now. It could save you time and money in the future.

Property Marking

The main Crime Prevention purpose of marking your property is to make it less attractive to thieves to steal it in the first place, as they know that if they are caught in possession of it by the Police and the Police can quickly establish it is stolen property, they are in trouble! In addition, the traceable property may be more difficult for them to "cash in" with another criminal or to a willing purchaser of the item.

Although etching/punching your postcode and plot number on property can be very effective it is often not always a practical option so we have other ways of effective Property Marking.

Mark all property such as lawnmowers and hedge trimmers, marking can be done with ultra-violet marker pens, stamping or even with paint. The suggestion is that you mark your property with your plot number and the post code HA6 1NW

Reporting a crime

If you've been the victim of a crime, it's really important to report it. We know that sometimes it's not easy to decide to come forward. But we also know that if no one reports a crime, it's as if it never happened. If no one reports a crime, the criminal is free to commit more crime, damaging more communities and individuals. It's also important to report crime for your own practical purposes, like getting a crime number from the police so that you can make an insurance claim.

When and How do I report a crime?

As soon as you possibly can, giving as much information as possible. For non emergency dial 0300 123 1212 In an emergency dial 999 In an emergency, or if you are facing immediate threat, dial 999 and ask for the police. Your call will be redirected to your local force

Manure

The question also arose of whether the stable manure is now safe to use. The guilty chemical - aminopyralid - is now banned for use in pasture-land, although in fact Tim and Gayle have never used it on their land. The official advice from Dow, the manufacturer, is that if affected manure is dug or rotavated - as opposed to being merely composted - then any residue should have dissipated within three years, ie. by now. Several plot-holders have been using the stable manure for some time and none have reported adverse effects. But the advice still remains to dig it in well and be vigilant for any side-effects. But please, don't use it fresh, as this can cause nitrogen depletion and other problems. Stack it - alone or with other materials - turning frequently to introduce oxygen to help rot it down; and when you use it, dig it in thoroughly rather than using it as a mulch.

A Date for Your Diary - Northwood Hills Fun Day

The Northwood Hills Chamber of Commerce is organising another Fun Day - hopefully with slightly better weather than last year - and we have been asked to run a Plant Sale. The date is Saturday May 7th, and although I did point out that it was a little early in the season, I promised that we would do our best. So when you are sowing seeds, try to sow a few extra that you can pot up ready for the beginning of May. We were thinking tomatoes, squashes, herbs and the like, but I'm sure you can come up with plenty of other ideas. We'll arrange a collection point nearer the time - keep an eye on the notice boards. And we will be looking for volunteers for the day itself, to set up during the morning, and to run the stand during the afternoon. If you can spare just an hour, it will help. (And we found last year that a regular turn-over of "staff" gave the whole stand a buzz.) Last year - even though we were too late getting involved to be able to sell plants - we received plenty of attention and added a number of names to the waiting list. (Most of whom are now members and receiving this email!) And as the aim of the Chamber of Commerce is to help re-vitalise Northwood Hills as a centre, it's a project well worth supporting.
